What is Fika?



(n.) a social coffee break with one's colleagues, friends, date or family, usually accompanied with sweet, baked goods

Fika is a concept, a state of mind, an attitude and an important part of Swedish culture. Many Swedes consider that it is almost essential to make time for fika every day

Most Swedes combine their break with some pastry, called fikabröd. Among the most popular are kanelbullar (cinnamon buns), chokladbollar (chocolate balls) and biscuits.

Why Fika?



- Among the consensus-oriented Swedes, *fika* is a great way to exchange knowledge, opinions about what's going on in the company, and generally bond with your colleagues.
- Fika time takes place everyday at 10am and 3pm, for 10-30 minutes.
- Indirectly it helps with staff morale, the feeling of community on campus, the work/life balance, and overall wellbeing.
